# Our Curriculum

Here you will be able to find out the details about what your child will be learning week by week. We have included the books and songs we will focus on. If you have any questions, please ask.

# Week 1 - Rhyme

- Develop an understanding of rhyme.
- Matching rhyming words and continuing a rhyming string.

- Hearing and writing sounds in the correct sequence and applying Phase 2 and 3 knowledge.
- © Writing rhyming words in a 3 and 4 word sentence.
- © Reading Room on the Broom by Julia Donaldson
- © Songs of the week See the Little Bunnies Sleeping

## Week 2 - The Hungry Caterpillar

- © Sequencing events from the story.
- © Sorting food into healthy and less healthy choices.
- © Retelling the story.
- Phonics /er/air/. Words with double letters longer words. Tricky Words all taught so far.
- © Reading The Life Cycle of a Butterfly.
- Writing 2 stages in the life cycle of a butterfly. Using segmenting skills to hear and write, making phonetically plausible attempts.
- © Song of the week Old Macdonald had a Farm





# Week 3 - Science Week - Time

- © Understanding time in a range of practical ways including actions and over time.
- © Phonics words with 2 or more diagraphs and becoming confident to use these independently.
- © Writing with growing confidence 3 and 4 word sentences to continue to develop an understanding of using spaces between words.
- © Reading
- © Song of the week Miss Molly had a Dolly

#### Week 4 - Ducks

- © Understand transition from egg to duck and the various stages of growth.
- © Explore how ducks hatch and describe the changes they go through until a grown duck.
- © Observing the ducks growing in the incubator.
- © Phonics longer words, words ending in /ing/ and compound words.
- © Writing about 2 of the stages of the life cycle of a duck. Using digraphs in words. Reinforcing capital letters and full stops.
- © Reading Ducks information text and the Little Red Hen.
- © Song of the week Goosey Goosey

#### Week 5 - Easter

- © Sequencing a story in pictures through discussion with a partner.
- © Retell the story using pictures to support the sequence.
- © Explaining how we celebrate festivals at home.
- Melting chocolate to make crispy nests by following a set of instructions.
- © Phonics longer words, words with /s/ in the middle, words ending \_s and words with /es/ at the end.
- © Writing a set of instructions and using numbers to order the sequence.
- © Reading The Easter Story and Mr Men The Easter Egg Hunt
- Song of the week class Sing Off competition song

#### Numbers & Patterns

- Week 1 Good working knowledge of and name common 3D shapes, manipulate and rotate them to talk about and understand their properties. To recognise a repeating pattern, spot a mistake in a pattern so it repeats and generate patterns of own design
- © Week 2 Good working knowledge of numbers from 0-10, how to represent/record values/amounts and number bonds to 5.
- © Week 3 Good working knowledge of numbers 0-10, comparing amounts, with focus on 'fewer than' using various representations, and addition.
- ☼ Week 4 To develop a deeper understanding of the composition of numbers beyond 10. To develop an understanding of how quantities can be changed by adding more. To learn to re-count all the items to see how many there is altogether and when ready count on.
- <sup>™</sup> Week 5 Develop an understanding of combining numbers to find totals. To continue to develop a deeper understanding of the composition of numbers beyond 10. - © Developing an understanding of a range of brush strokes, collage to create affects and their noticing skills.
- Producing a tiger showstopper.

# PSHE through our whole school programme - Jigsaw

- © Our theme this half term across the school is 'Healthy Me'.
- © Meditation, looking after own wellbeing and calming strategies.
- © Understanding what it means to be kind and use gentle hands.
- © Showing kindness to others.
- © Understanding that sometimes it is ok to feel angry and say how I can deal with this.

#### Music

- Introduce themselves, say and sing their name confidently.
- Tap and play a steady pulse.
- © Sing simple tunes by call and response.
- © Play the rhythm of their name.
- © To recall names of instruments.
- © To play the rhythm of the words and the pulse with increasing accuracy.
- © To be able to play long and short sounds.




# Ideas for Home

Please remember the most important thing is reading with your child. Our favourite Apps are Teach Your Monster to Read and White Rose 1 Minute Maths. Below are some book reviews, favourites from our teachers that you might enjoy reading at home.

# World Book Day

Thursday 7th March is World Book Day which we will celebrate across the school. year we are saying that children can dress up as a book character if they



should choose, dress down in home clothes or wear school uniform as usual — it is up to you! If your child would like to share a favourite book it could be brought into school or shared via Tapestry.

#### Science Week

The week beginning 6<sup>th</sup> March we will be focusing on National Science across the school.



The theme this year is 'time'.

#### Reading

Don't forget to get your child's reading book changed weekly. Children can put their reading books with their red books in the basket by the registration board on Fridays. The class teacher will change it during the day. Please note the titles of the books your child has read in their contact book so we can ensure they get a different one. Reading with your child for 10-20 mins as often as possible, ideally daily, has such a big impact on their reading and writing skills and development, as well as their vocabulary. Children who read often tend to be the most successful. Bedtime stories can be a great way to interest your child in reading.

## Wednesday Assembly and Rising Stars

The Reception children will continue to attend assembly on a Wednesday afternoon. We have been very impresssed with how the children sit and pay attention. Most Wednesday assemblies will include Rising Stars. Each week 2 pupils from every class are awarded a certificate for outstanding learning or behaviour. The assemblies will have a focus on our monthly school value, festivals from around the world and current affairs. School Values: March – Tolerance, April – Patience, May – Generoristy.

Can Raccoon convince his friend Bear that other shapes can be fun too? He's got his work cut out because "triangles are too pointy" and "circles are too circley" and Bear loves SQUARES! A wonderfully colourful celebration of shapes, friendship and the power of seeing things from a different perspective. I hope you enjoy!

#### Miss Miss Giles recommends

Oi Frog! Cat is determined to teach Frog exactly where everyone is supposed to sit. It's not about being comfortable (Lion sat on an iron can attest to that!) it's about doing what's right. Frog is less convinced. And what sits on frogs?

I love reading this story to Fireflies it is a fun rhyming book which draws you in with Cat's unwavering conviction of the rightful place each animal should sit and Frog always questioning. The rhymes are perfect and easy for children to follow, but it's the illustrations that will make you belly laugh. This is a book you will want to read over and over again.
