We are sure that this new term will be just as wonderful as the last one!



Our Spring Term One Topic: Light Fantastic

In English, our learning will be based around studing short films. We will be learning about the different elements of film and use this to support a range of writing activities, such as descriptive narratives, a non-chronological report and a voice over. Here's our rough



overview for this half term:

Week 1 - Narrative (based on 'El Caminante')

In Maths, we will continue to build upon our knowlegde of place value and the written methods for all four operations. We will also begin to look at fractions and calculating with fractions. This will include adding, subtracting and multiplying fractions and the division of fractions by whole numbers. We will also look at how to convert between fractions, decimals and percentages. Here's the scheduled overview for the half term:

Week 1 — Adding and subtracting fractions (simple and mixed number)

Week 2 — Ordering and comparing fractions

Week 3 — Multiplying fractions (simple and mixed number)

Week 4 - Dividing fractions & assessment week

Week 5 - Percentages

Week 6 — Converting between fractions, decimals and percentages

Science, our topic is called 'Light' and we will be looking at how humans can see. We will also cover reflection, refractions, how shadows are formed and why shadows change size.

In Geography, we will be learning about Earthquakes and Volcanoes. We will initially learn about the structure of the Earth to develop our understanding of how earthquakes and volcanoes occur and the effects that they have on the planet.

In **Music**, the children will be learning how to play the guitar with Mrs Horwood. Alongside this, the children will also be developing their improvisation and composition skills.

In **Computing**, we are going to continue to use the Purple Mash scheme of work and will be learning about how to input and use spreadsheets.

In Art, we are going to be studying the work of Claude Monet by developing our painting skills using water colour. We will begin by mixing colours to create a colour wheel before creating our own piece of work in the style of Monet.

In R.E, we are going to be focusing on The Bible and begin to consider how The Bible originated and the different themes and text-types covered within it.


In P.S.H.E., we will be looking at the value of the month for January — 'Self-confidence'. The other value of the month for this half term is 'Loyalty', which will be our value for the month of February. We will also be continuing our 'Jigsaw' scheme of work, with our next unit 'Dreams and Goals'. This unit will give us the opportunity to set some personal goals and recognise the necessary steps that we need to take in order to achieve them.

'The London Eye Mystery' by Siobhan Dowd

Ted likes the weather, he also likes statistics and routine but his life is thrown into disarray when his Aunt Gloria and cousin Salim arrive, like a hurricane, to stay in London en-route to a new life in New York. Ted and his older sister Kat arrange to take Salim on the London Eye but although they watch him go up in a pod, he never comes down again. Salim is missing. Ted's analytical mind becomes an asset as he and Kat piece together the information surrounding their cousin's disappearance and begin to unravel the mystery. This is a beautifully written and engaging book.

'The Treekeepers' by Kieran Larwood

An epic tale of trees of power and a world under threat, from the author of the bestselling Five Realms series. Here come the roots of the Shadow Tree. Whatever they touch will never get free. Liska lives in Arborven, a city surrounding an extraordinary tree that gives all those living there special powers. As a shapeshifter, Liska is training as a warrior. When she discovers that the Tree is under threat, it is her duty to act — but she can't convince anyone to listen to her. So with Lug, whose power over earthworms is dismissed as useless, and a ghost—girl, Elowen, she goes on an epic journey to defeat the worst threat their world has ever known.

'Sky Chasers' by Emma Carol

An encounter with a boy dangling from the sky changes pickpocket Magpie's life forever. Like her, the boy dreams of flying over the rooftops of Paris. Together with Pierre, Magpie is soon caught up in a world of inflatable bloomers, spies and a trio of unruly animals in a race to be the first to fly a hot air balloon — in front of the King and Queen of France.

'The Windrush Child' by Benjamin Zephaniah

This story is all the more incredible as it is true. It revolves around a boy, Leonard, who travels to England from Jamaica. His head is full of questions: Why are we leaving? What will life be like in England? Will I make friends? The life he has been promised isn't the life he finds when he arrives in Southampton. This is a story of grit, resilience and self-confidence.
